4	Subject aims/content This course emphasizes mastery of skills in applying the spontaneous (linear) line sketch technique with real objects and environments. Lecture activities are carried out with daily exercises and creative instructions to improve skills in various approaches. The introduction covers techniques for creating drawings using pencil, pen and ink, and watercolor. The main topics of lectures include tips for achieving balance, accuracy, spontaneity, and speed; strategies for working in the field, selecting subjects, addressing the audience, capturing people in motion.
